CONDUCTOR – Tim Pithers

Tim Pithers is a conductor and musical director based in Exeter, Devon. He is passionate about community and student music-making and firmly believes that classical music should be made as accessible as possible to performers and audiences alike.

He has spent the past year studying conducting with Denise Ham at the London Conducting Academy and has participated in masterclasses with distinguished guest tutors. He has been tutored by Dominic Grier and Rodolfo Saglimbeni at the George Hurst Conductors 'Course at Sherborne Summer School of Music and at the Girton Conducting Course in Cambridge. Tim undertook his degree in Music and French at the University of Exeter where he studied violin with Mary Eade, composition with Joe Duddell and specialised in musical direction.

Tim enjoys working with ensembles of varying degrees of experience and aims to develop ambitious objectives for amateur groups. As well as holding the role of Musical Director of the Dunsford Singers, he is also Conductor of the Exeter University Symphony Orchestra, Exeter University Symphonic Wind Orchestra, Dartmouth Orchestra and EX4 Chamber Orchestra.

Carol Galton has lived and worked in Devon for the past 36 years. She was born in South Africa where she completed a Masters in Philosophy before coming to the UK to continue as a postgraduate student. In her role as music coordinator she was involved with children's music making at all levels. She now teaches piano and cello, and accompanies instrumentalists and singers, alongside performing. She divides her spare time between vegetable growing, playing chamber music with local musicians and playing cello in the Devon Philharmonic Orchestra.

Poem 'Gloria in Excelsis Deo' by Jan Middleton

Gloria by Antoni Vivaldi (1678-1741)

An absolute favourite with singers and audiences all over the world, this choral masterpiece is full of distinctive melodies and beautiful rhythms, and seems to personify rejoicing. It presents the traditional Gloria from the Latin mass in twelve varied, cantata-like settings. Dating from about 1716, Vivaldi wrote it for the female choir and instrumentalists of the Ospedale della Pieta, an important charitable institution in Venice, where he worked as a music master. For two centuries after his death, the Gloria lay undiscovered until the late 1920s, when it was found buried among a pile of forgotten Vivaldi manuscripts. However, it was not performed until September 1939. The rest, as they say, is history ...

Sing, choirs of angels, Sing in exultation, Sing, all ye citizens of Heaven above! Glory to God In the highest: Original Latin, attributed to John Francis Wade (1711-1786)

There Is No Rose: John Joubert (1927 - 2019) composed this exquisite piece in 1954

The lyrics are from the early fifteenth century poem, when England was a Roman Catholic country. It celebrates the Virgin Mary, speaking of how heaven and earth meet in the 'little space' of her womb, and weaving the everyday English of the common people with formal Latin of the Church. Christian devotion has long used the rose as representative of Mary's beauty. The recitation of the 'Ave Maria' was popularly called a rosarium, from which we get the word 'rosary'. Mary is also described as a ' mystical rose without thorns'; the red rose a symbol of her love; a white rose symbolising her purity. *Res Miranda; a thing to be wondered at Paresforma: of equal form (Jesus is God in persons three) Gaudeamus: let us rejoice*

Transeamus : let us be changed (by following Christ)

The Three Kings: Peter Cornelius (1824-1874) The German composer Cornelius set his own carol for a bass soloist against Philip Nicolai's (1556-1608) hymn 'How Brightly Shines the Morning Star'. Cornelius was a little confused, as he thought it was about the Star of Bethlehem, which led the Three Kings to Jesus, when actually the hymn is about the Advent Star, an allegory for the arrival of Jesus. Never mind – it's beautiful song and the soloist is our very own **John Sawyer**.

Messiah Choruses: First performed in 1742, and sung by a choir not much bigger than the Dunsford Singers, Handel's famous oratorio tells the story of Jesus' Nativity, Passion, Resurrection and Ascension. We have chosen to sing two tuneful and energetic choruses from Part One. *And the Glory of the Lord* announces the revelation of God's glory in a confident, affirmative way, setting the scene for the story of Jesus' birth. *His Yoke is Easy* concludes the 'Christmas' section; the words offer a sense of relief, release and togetherness for those who choose to follow Him.

Reading *The Cultivation of Christmas Trees* by TS Eliot 1954 Giles Frampton

The poet advocates that as we grow older we should strive to preserve the innocence, simplicity and wonderment with which a child regards Christmas. He warns us that ageing will bring fatigue and tedium into our lives but our accumulated memories of the annual emotion of wonderful Christmases may bring us great joy. He offers a timely reminder that the incarnation of Jesus foreshadows his death and Christian belief in his return to Earth.

Alpha And Omega by Bee Harley: Bee Harley is an Exeter-based composer who has written many beautiful pieces. She often takes extracts from poems and adds her special musical magic to create atmospheric and memorable compositions. In this song she has taken the last, powerful six lines of The Cultivation of Christmas Trees and works them into something profoundly moving.

I Believe in Father Christmas was composed in 1975. Greg Lake said that he wrote it in protest at the commercialisation of Christmas. The lyricist Peter Sinfield described the song as 'a picture postcard Christmas with morbid edges', and said that his words were about a loss of innocence and childhood belief. In between verses, the 'lalalalal' riff comes from Prokofiev's 'Troika' or 'Sleigh Ride'. Queen's 'Bohemian Rhapsody' kept it from being the 1975 Christmas Number One. Greg Lake told The Guardian " It's lovely getting the old royalty cheque every year but it's not enough to buy my own island in the Caribbean."

He arranged this lovely song in 1987, using the traditional Irish Celtic blessing of wishing someone well in their journey through life. References to the sun, rain, wind, stars, flowers and storms create a profound connection to Nature and yet also reference God's mercy and the Holy Spirit. We hope it sends you on your way into the Christmas season with a sense of peace and goodwill to all.
